Last year, this family lost one of of its most remarkable members with the death of Ruth Proctor Covert on July 30, just days before her 99th birthday.She was always called "Sister" by her siblings, and so she became "Aunt Sister" to all us nieces and nephews.

As this is a genealogy newsletter, here is her family story. She was the oldest of four children of Henry Proctor and Mary Ella Hinton Proctor; the granddaughter of John William Proctor (1862-1928) and his first wife Laura Brown Proctor (1862-1893); and the great-granddaughter of Whitmel Proctor (1829-1884) and Betsy Williams Proctor (1838-1895).

She was born in the family farm home her father built on Trap Range Road in Edgecombe County, NC, and lived there until she was 11, when they moved to Lee County in 1928. As she was the source for much of the oral history I have on our family, I obviously asked her about this move, and she told me this: Their "pretty house," as she described it, in Edgecombe County had carbide lights and other amenities that few people in that area had at the time. Her father farmed tobacco, and also kept abundant fruit trees. In 1925, her father

let an insurance man named Luther T. Bulluck talk him into trading homes -though how he was talked into it or for what reason is unknown. A total of 49 acres were deeded to Bulluck and M.R. Robbins of Nash County. Henry moved his family to what Aunt Sister described as a "very ordinary house" in Lee County, "on the lower road to Sanford."

The family later settled in Moncure, where she would live out most of the rest of her life. In November 1933 she married Otis Martin Covert (1909-1980), and they had one child, Edward Martin Covert in 1944.

No one who knew her has ever had anything but the finest things to say about Ruth Proctor Covert. A truly remarkable woman in so very many ways during her life (her 100th birthday would be this August) he is deeply and lovingly missed.
